

Please --- don't make my dinner a health hazard

Some of the most common rat and mouse baits are lethal to birds of prey including Owls through 'secondary poisoning' from their baited prey. Don't poison their dinner!

- Use traps rather than baits to control rats and mice.
- If you choose to use baits, read the label carefully and store out of reach of pets and children.
- ✓ USE one containing the active ingredient coumatetralyl or warfarin and carefully follow package instructions.
- X DO NOT USE those with brodifacoum and bromodialone – remember b is for bad!**
