



ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

Our award winning Environmental Education work encompasses three unique programs working with grades 3 to 6 across the region. We now work across twelve schools to build understanding and connection to our landscape and provide students with opportunities to actively contribute to caring for it. We connect them with cultural custodians, local experts and community volunteers to build authentic experiences and real-life learning opportunities.

















Our connection to place is intertwined with a sense of belonging to community and a shared sense of stewardship. Using inquiry-based learning, Our Patch happens out in the local environment. School communities are motivated to learn through student questions, through a sense of purpose and authenticity to address actual 'real world' tasks and concerns.

Highlights included:

- · 7 primary schools engaged,
- · 433 students participated in the program
- 5368 student hours of environmental education in class and on country.
- Over 20 community partners shared their knowledge and principles of environmental stewardship with school groups
- 113 excursion/incursion sessions

ADOPT A SPOT

Connecting every school in the Cape to Cape region with a nearby bushland or coastal reserve.

Through much valued, consistent commitment from major partner, Line in the Sand, 2024/2025 has welcomed the expansion of this program, with the addition of three new primary schools - Adopt a Spot 'North.'

Highlights included:

- 9th year running
- Now delivered across 12 schools
- 545 students engaged
- · 2,142 student hours engaged
- · 780 native plants established





WAATU KAATIJIN (OCEAN LEARNING)

Through Waatu Kaatijin, students study, identify marine threats, engage with stakeholders, propose and implement conservation measures, and share their knowledge with the community. Fostering a sense of responsibility, Waatu Kaatijin equips students with problem-solving, reflection, and practical skills for marine conservation.

Highlights included:

- 90 students participated
- Marine Expert Panel / Workshop designed for maximum local relevance
- Immersion Day featuring 9 marine expert-led sessions focused on the cultural and ecological importance of Gnarabup Beach and key environmental threats, to guide future projects addressing these issues
- Ocean Connection Day with 5 presenter-led learning sessions at the rivermouth
- 990 student hours accumulated

STRATEGIC ENVIRONMENTAL WEED CONTROL ARUM LILY BLITZ / WOODY WEED CAMPAIGN

Both funded by the Western Australian Government's State NRM Program, the Arum Lily Blitz campaign began in 2019 to prevent Arum Lily from outcompeting native vegetation and dominating our landscape, and the Woody Weed campaign is tackling invasive woody weeds (Sydney Golden Wattle, Sweet Pittosporum, and feral olives) that threaten remnant bushland, increase fire risk, and undermine native ecosystems.

The Arum Lily Blitz has demonstrated that the toxic weed's spread is unacceptable to thousands of people. There are currently over 2200 properties registered with the Arum Lily Blitz across 26,000 ha, with hundreds joining the campaign each year. Landholders are undertaking arum lily control on their properties doing the work themselves or employing spray contractors. This high level of interest and engagement inspires us and drives the campaign.

PROTECT WOODITJUP BILYA (MARGARET RIVER)

The Wooditjup Bilya is of great cultural and environmental significance. It is iconic and recognised as one of the healthier rivers in the southwest. However, it faces significant threats and its protection represents one of the core priorities for our organisation. We were thrilled to have received the lan Potter Foundation funding in 2024, and commence the significant four year Protecting Wooditjup Bilya project, with additional funding from State NRM, Water Corporation and the program's founding partner – the Pater Charitable Fund.

Meanwhile, the Friends of Wooditjup Bilya program has continued to make tangible impact towards the protection and restoration of Wooditjup Bilya by building community understanding and connection to the river through diverse speakers and event leaders including scientists, cultural custodians, river carers and conservationists. It has actively tackled degradation along the river foreshore through community action and supported volunteer events, every FoWB event held has booked out promptly and the volunteer database of river custodians grows continually. Both programs will work well together for maximum impact.

Important work towards this during the year included:

- 900m fencing along one of the last sections of unfenced main channel river foreshore
- Partnering with local farmers and landholders to repair degraded zones beside a priority refuge pool.
- Strategic environmental weed control throughout the catchment
- Wooditjup Bilya Collaborative Management Group continues to reinvigorate cross-agency implementation of the protection strategy.
- Scientists and experts connecting with schools and the community about the values, threats and action needed.
- 'Turtle trackers' formed to collect information on the Southwestern snake necked turtle.
- Catchment tour highlighting the values and threats to the river and our project impacts

CARING FOR COAST

In partnership with Line in the Sand this program collaborates with cultural custodians, local volunteer coastcare groups, boardriders, Local Government and DBCA to engage people in on ground coastal protection and restoration.

Significant highlights from the year include:

- Collaboration with the Margaret River Wine Industry and 70 industry volunteers at the annual coastal rehabilitation event at the rivermouth
- Flagship 20th anniversary WA Beach Clean Up Sip n Sort event in partnership with Tangaroa Blue and Margaret River Brewhouse
- · WSL 'Activation' for young surfers at Grunters Beach, laying brushing to close off sensitive areas
- Coastal Walk at Talinup Boodja (Augusta) with Wadandi Pibulmun Yunungjarli elder and custodian Dr Wayne 'Wonitji' Webb – at full capacity

Youth Marine Stewardship Program

Aiming to build a culture of coastal stewardship and giving young locals with a keen interest in the coast and ocean the opportunity to learn from leaders in coastal conservation, the participants were mentored and supported to develop their own projects. In collaboration with local groups and marine experts, they built leadership skills to effect change and proudly presented significant impact projects at the HEART. These included beach clean-ups, litter station installations, an art exhibition, and the production of locally distributed Dive I.D. slate.














CAPE NATURALISTE CONSERVATION ENTERPRISE

Imagine a landscape repaired – native plants and animals flourishing in a world-leading example of conservation, by a community working together with a bold shared vision.

The Friends of Meelup, partnering with Nature Conservation, received State NRM funding to implement the Cape Naturaliste Conservation Enterprise over 2024-2027.

We are developing a comprehensive, cross-tenure approach to conservation on the cape, including funding for on-ground work and subsidies for private landowners involved. The CNCE subsidises the cost of weed and feral animal control, revegetation and fencing of creeklines and bushland.

Highlights include:

- Event launch with 70 attendees and special guest speaker Keith Bradby
- First round of feral animal control offered and completed
- Fauna monitoring capturing quendas, western ringtail possums and phascogales on camera
- Sold out cultural burning workshop with Wadandi Pibulmen Custodian Zac Webb, on country
- The coming together of the conservation community on the cape land managers, 34 land owners and community groups – all working towards the same goal
